How many of us want our children to feel that they need to be perfect? We want them to be racked with guilt when they make a mistake? Feeling like a complete loser when they mess up or don't know something?

of course not!

We want our kids to do their best. But most of us know that having perfection as a personal goal is going to result in a lot of heartache and shame.



If we believe the old saying that "actions speak louder than words", what do our actions say to our kids?

This struck me as I heard a story about an amazing young mom. She is a single mom, going to post secondary school with the goal of getting a better job and creating a better life for herself and her children. I don't know how she juggles everything that she does - with a smile on her face. I'm not sure I could do what she is doing.

When she talked to some other moms about a momentary lapse she had with her kids, she expressed how awful she felt about it. She had immediately done her best to fix it with her children - apologizing and telling them that was not the kind of mom she wanted to be. Her children forgave her, but she continued to carry guilt and shame around with her.

What were her actions teaching her children? She made a mistake, took responsibility for it, apologized, and is trying to prevent a repeat of her mistake. Isn't that what we say we want our kids to do when they mess up?

But she continued to beat herself up about it. She felt terrible. She put herself down. You could see her usual motivation and energy being sapped as she talked about it. Her friends were worried that she was going to throw in the towel and give up on achieving her educational goals because she was feeling like a failure.

Is that what we want for our kids when they make a mistake?

What do you model for them when you aren't perfect?

SCHOOL BUS LOOP/SCHOOL ZONE SAFETY
